She rode with a jumper trainer who would make her drop her irons and jump 5 foot fences. I whined about 3 ½ feet. She used to hold cows on pasture all day in Madera. In her cow days she met up with a guy who had a mule and let her work some cows on her. She knew a good mule, as her first long eared mount was one of my favorite, Sanger Red. She rode cutters with some good friends, one being Tod White who ended up dropping Hot Lips off at her house. 

Approved Rule Changes For 2022 AMA Shows

Submitted by Maggie Moore, AMA Vice President/Awards

(Decision made at July 24,2021 Board Meeting)



Non-pro division: Walk/jog division for youth and amateurs. Classes include western trail, western pleasure, English pleasure, ranch riding and ranch pleasure. Competitors may cross enter other divisions.

Championship point system:

Requirements to receive points: all animals must be registered with the AMA under the current owner. Owners and exhibitors must be current AMA members. Registration and membership numbers must appear on each show entry form to have points for that show counted towards championships.

Championship points calculations: all classes from all shows will count, 3 shows minimum, must compete in 3 divisions with a minimum of 10 points in each division.

Amateur donkey walk/jog division: Division open to amateur donkey exhibitors. Classes included English pleasure, western pleasure, trail, ranch riding, ranch pleasure and in-hand trail. Competitors may cross enter other divisions.

Show year defined as November 1 to October 31 to allow all points to be calculated by the end of the year.
