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The mule world has lost two great people in August with the passing of Diana Laird and Albert Andrews

Diana Laird

Double L Ranch has a hole in it's heart with the passing of Diana Laird. Diana and her husband moved from Del Mar to Bishop in 1989 for his retirement. Diana was a school teacher in Del Mar and continued teaching kindergarten after their move to Bishop. Linda came to stay with Diana after her father's unexpected passing, working at Rock Creek pack station and discovering the magic of mules. Several years later, Diana asked Linda "are you gonna stay?" And from that question came the start of the Double LL Ranch in 2003. Diana and Linda were partners in their training business. They



started by training mules and going on road trips showing them with a few dear

friends; Jan Huffstutler and Chris McParland.



Linda had purchased Sweet Melissa as a 5 year old for Diana and they clicked right from the beginning. Showing in Pomona, someone asked if Diana would sell Melissa, Linda replied "my mother would sell me before she'd sell Melissa." Linda claims Diana has more pictures of Melissa than of Linda.

Double L Ranch has had a great many students but is known for their youth program. From her many years as a

teacher, Diana knew how to deal with the kids and this lead to many young people training at Double L. Diana always had Linda's back but would set her and the kids straight if they got out of line. Many fine competitors came from the guidance of Diana and Linda working together.

New Rules Approved for 2020

Amateur division will be split into three divisions:

- Amateur English Performance & Hunter/Jumper points will be earned in English performance classes, hunter jumper classes, English equitation and showmanship
- Amateur Western Performance— points earned in western performance classes, western equitation and showmanship.
- Amateur Ranch—points in ranch division classes and mulemanship.

A new division added: **Pre Green** walk/jog for mules in their first year of showing. Classes offered: western pleasure, ranch pleasure, English pleasure, hunter under saddle, trail, W/E dressage. Pre green may not cross enter other divisions including youth and amateur.

Youth drivers may enter open driving classes if no youth classes are offered. Points will be accumulated in the youth driving division.

Donkey classes added:

- Cattle sorting
- Donkey hunter hack with jumps 18' 2'.

Gymkhana only: No excessive hitting or spurring allowed but tapping twice on the shoulder will be allowed.

Super reinsmanship and **driven dressage** will be added to single and team driving divisions.

Trail obstacle definition: multiple obstacles may not be combined to count as one obstacle for trail classes.

Deadline for competitors to check points: Points chairman must be notified by December 20 for errors or questions regarding year end points. After this date, no changes to points will occur.

Ranch reining will be added to Ranch division—patterns will contain 2 spins each direction and 1 large and 1 small circle for green, amateur and bridled divisions.

Loni Langdon


Hello American Mule Association Members!

Megan Hensley of Holistic Hooves

Follow Megan Hensley AKA "The Donkey Farrier" on Facebook or Instagram and you'll quickly learn how passionate she is about serving donkeys in a positive and educated light. Her business "Holistic Hooves" takes a wellness approach that you won't find with many hoof care providers. She is equal parts farrier, educator and welfare advocate. There's a beautiful intention to Megan that strives to improve lives, both human and equine, through education, inspiration, empowerment and resources.



She first fell in love with mules while working on a trail crew in the Stanislaus National Forrest. With the desire of becoming a packer, she enrolled in the Pacific Coast Horseshoeing School. Although she did not follow her packing dreams, she has created a unique niche working with donkeys since 2007.

We recently met up in person and had so much to talk about!

Her unique perspective about how to approach skeptical equines that have been labeled as "bad for the farrier" is so refreshing. She is light hearted, a self proclaimed "goofball" and her approach to working with donkeys is to get the job done in a way that makes the experience positive and relaxed for both the owner and equine.

Megan has a special way of getting around skeptical equines and I witnessed this myself. Although not a donkey, she trimmed a mustang that had not had his feet attended to in many moons because he was labeled as "difficult and dangerous". She made friends with him in minutes, took special care to read his body language and trimmed 3 of his four hooves out in our pasture, on a loose line! I was impressed by her ability to allow Chi to have a positive experience while being effective without force. She took the time that was needed, allowed this horse not to feel trapped and I believe he appreciated her way of handling him.

Part of Megan's call to serving the greater equine community is to bust myths that donkeys are inherently "bad". She is inspired to help her fellow hoof care colleagues understand donkeys as a species: where they evolved from, why they do what they do, what their nutritional needs are, and how sensitive they can be is all part of what motivates her.
